Oakland Interfaith Gospel Choir

Get ready for some glorious gospel music as this award-winning Oakland choir hosts its 7th annual Black History Month event at 7 p.m. Feb. 20. The choir, which has performed with such acts as Joshua Nelson, the Prince of Kosher Gospel, the Blind Boys of Alabama, the Duke Ellington Orchestra, Linda Ronstadt, MC Hammer and Tramaine Hawkins, is led by artistic director Terrance Kelly.
